### Crystal Structure Refinement and Luminescence Property of Blue-Green-Emitting CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:Ce<sup>3+</sup>,Li<sup>+</sup>,Eu<sup>2+</sup> Phosphors

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Ce<sup>3+</sup>/Li<sup>+</sup>, Eu<sup>2+</sup> singly doped and Ce<sup>3+</sup>/Li<sup>+</sup>/Eu<sup>2+</sup>-co-doped CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> phosphors have been prepared by the conventional solid-state reaction method. The crystal structure of melilite-type CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> phase and the preferred crystallographic positions <sup>10</sup> of the doped ions were refined using Rietveld method. The

- luminescence properties and energy transfer of CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:Ce<sup>3+</sup>,Li<sup>+</sup>,Eu<sup>2+</sup> were studied in detail. Ce<sup>3+</sup>/Li<sup>+</sup> activated CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> phosphor has a strong absorption band in the range of 200-450 nm and perform a blue emission centered at 157
- <sup>15</sup> 477 nm. When Eu<sup>2+</sup> ions are co-doped with Ce<sup>3+</sup>/Li<sup>+</sup>, the emission color of CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:Ce<sup>3+</sup>,Li<sup>+</sup>,Eu<sup>2+</sup> phosphors under the irradiation of 365 nm can be tuned from blue to green via the energy transfer from Ce<sup>3+</sup> to Eu<sup>2+</sup> ions. Also the involved energy transfer process and the corresponding mechanism between Ce<sup>3+</sup>
- 20 and Eu<sup>2+</sup> have been discussed in detail. These results indicate that the as-reported CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:Ce<sup>3+</sup>,Li<sup>+</sup>,Eu<sup>2+</sup> phosphors have potential applications in near-UV chip pumped white LEDs.

#### 1 Introduction

Silicate-based phosphors have gained enormous academic and 25 commercial interests because of their rigid crystal structure, abundant crystalline phase, multi-color emission and high luminous efficiency, and suitable physical and chemical features.<sup>1-4</sup> Herein, many melilite-based phosphors have been developed as the key materials used in different optical 30 application fields. Zhang reported the tunable bluish green to yellowish green Ca2(1-x)Sr2xAl2SiO7:Eu2+ phosphors.5 Wu reported the Ce3+ and Eu2+ codoped Ca2Al2SiO7 phosphor and discussed the photoluminescence and thermoluminescence properties.6 Li also reported the luminescent properties of  $_{35}\ Sr_2Al_2SiO_7:Ce^{3+},Eu^{2+}$  phosphors and discussed the possible application for near UV-excited white light-emitting diodes (w-LEDs).7 Chuai reported the Ca<sub>2</sub>Al<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:Eu<sup>3+</sup> phosphor by using the sol-gel method, and they found that the  $Eu^{3+}$  emission is markedly dependent of the structural properties of Ca2Al2SiO7.8

- <sup>40</sup> Jiao reported the Ca<sub>2</sub>Al<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:Ce<sup>3+</sup>,Tb<sup>3+</sup> phosphor<sup>9</sup> and Simondi reported the Ca<sub>2</sub>Al<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:Yb<sup>3+</sup>,Er<sup>3+</sup> phosphor.<sup>10</sup> Pan synthesized the Ce<sup>3+</sup>/Tb<sup>3+</sup> codoped Sr<sub>2</sub>Al<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> phosphors via sol-gel method for *w*-LEDs.<sup>11</sup> Ding reported the long persistent Sr<sub>2</sub>Al<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:Eu<sup>2+</sup>,Dy<sup>3+</sup> phosphors.<sup>12</sup> Zou reported a highly thermal
- <sup>45</sup> stable and waterproof red phosphor Sr<sub>2</sub>Al<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:Pr<sup>3+</sup>.<sup>13</sup> However, as for the middle component between the end members of

Sr<sub>2</sub>Al<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> and Sr<sub>2</sub>Al<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>, viz. CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> phase, there are little report on this type of phosphors except for the investigation on the luminescent properties of SrCaSiAl<sub>2</sub>O<sub>7</sub>:Eu<sup>2+</sup> and <sup>50</sup> CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:Eu<sup>3+</sup> phosphor.<sup>14-15</sup> But the phase structure is not carefully addressed, and there are no reports about the luminescence properties of Ce<sup>3+</sup> or Eu<sup>2+</sup> doped CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> phosphors till now.

Ce<sup>3+</sup> and Eu<sup>2+</sup> with broad-band excitation and emission act as <sup>55</sup> two important activators, which have been widely used for luminescent materials for illumination applications, such as *w*-LEDs phosphors. This is mainly ascribed to that their special emission properties combining a broad emission spectrum results in good color rendering properties, short decay times that can <sup>60</sup> avoid saturation. Moreover, the relatively little Stokes shift that allow excitation in the blue or near-UV part of the spectrum will also results in the high luminescence efficiency.<sup>16</sup> The lanthanide ion Ce<sup>3+</sup> exhibits 4f-5d emission in visible spectral or ultraviolet region and the emission is adjustable depending on the host

<sup>65</sup> lattice. In some Eu<sup>2+</sup> doped matrices, the blue to red emission and blue-light to UV excitation are usually observed through the lower energy of centroid of 5d level and the powerful crystal-field splitting. Consequently, Eu<sup>2+</sup> can be sensitized by the outstanding blue-emitting Ce<sup>3+</sup> because of the spectral overlap <sup>70</sup> between excitation band of Eu<sup>2+</sup> and emission band of Ce<sup>3+</sup>. So in a Ce<sup>3+</sup>/Eu<sup>2+</sup> co-doped single composition host we can expect to achieve adjustable emission spectrum based on the energy transfer between Ce<sup>3+</sup> and Eu<sup>2+</sup>.<sup>17,18</sup>

To the best our knowledge, no research has been carried out 75 when CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> was selected as the host doped with Ce<sup>3+</sup> and Eu<sup>2+</sup> ions up to now. In the present work, we reported the crystal structure refinement of CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> and preferred crystallographic sites for activators. CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> crystallizes in a tetragonal unit cell with space group  $P-42_1m$  and lattice constants so of a = 7.7595(2) Å. c = 5.1680(2) Å, and cell volume = 311.16(2)  $Å^3$  based on the powder diffraction Rietveld refinement. Moreover, we have demonstrated a novel blue-green tunable CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:Ce<sup>3+</sup>,Li<sup>+</sup>,Eu<sup>2+</sup> phosphor by varying the relative ratio of Ce<sup>3+</sup>/Eu<sup>2+</sup>. Their detailed luminescence properties and the 85 energy transfer between Ce<sup>3+</sup> and Eu<sup>2+</sup> have been discussed, and the energy transfer mechanism between Ce<sup>3+</sup> and Eu<sup>2+</sup> ions has been investigated systematically.

#### 2 Experimental section

#### 2.1 Materials and synthesis

The designed  $Ca_{1-2x}Sr_{1-y}Al_2SiO_7:xCe^{3+},xLi^+,yEu^{2+}$  phosphors were synthesized by conventional high temperature solid-state reaction. The starting materials used were as follows, SrCO<sub>3</sub>

<sup>5</sup> (A.R.), CaCO<sub>3</sub> (A.R.), Li<sub>2</sub>CO<sub>3</sub> (A.R.), Al<sub>2</sub>O<sub>3</sub> (A.R.), SiO<sub>2</sub> (A.R.), CeO<sub>2</sub> (99.99%), Eu<sub>2</sub>O<sub>3</sub> (99.99%). After mixing and grinding in an agate mortar for 20 min, the mixture was placed in a crucible and then sintered at 1300°C for 5h, in a reducing atmosphere of H<sub>2</sub> (10%) and N<sub>2</sub> (90%) to produce the final samples. Finally, the
 <sup>10</sup> prepared phosphors were cooled to room temperature and reground for further measurements.

#### 2.2 Characterization

The phase structures of the as-synthesized samples were checked by D8 Advance diffractometer (Bruker Corporation,

- <sup>15</sup> Germany) operating at 40 kV and 40 mA with Cu K $\alpha$  radiation ( $\lambda$  = 1.5406 Å). The photoluminescence emission (PL) and photoluminescence excitation (PLE) spectra were carried out by a fluorescence spectrophotometer (F-4600, HITACHI, Japan) equipped with a photomultiplier tube operating at 400 V, and a
- <sup>20</sup> 150 W Xenon lamp as the excitation source. The luminescence decay curves were obtained using a FLSP9200 fluorescence spectrophotometer (Edinburgh Instruments Ltd., U.K.), and a nF900 flash lamp was used as the excitation resource.

#### **3** Results and discussion

#### 25 3.1 Phase formation and crystal structure

As we know, the difference of the valence state and ionic radius plays an important role when the possible substitution is considered in the inorganic solid state materials. The ionic radius (*IR*) of Eu<sup>2+</sup> (r = 0.125 nm, when coordination number (*CN*) = 8) <sup>30</sup> is close to that of Sr<sup>2+</sup> (r = 0.126 nm at *CN* = 8), while the *IR* of Ca<sup>2+</sup> (r = 0.112 nm at *CN* = 8) is close to that of Ce<sup>3+</sup> (r = 0.114

- nm at CN = 8), but the valence state is different, so that a possible coupled substitution of Ce<sup>3+</sup>-Li<sup>+</sup> (Li+: r = 0.092 nm at CN = 8) for two Ca<sup>2+</sup> can be expected. Based on the above crystal
- <sup>35</sup> chemistry analysis, we can design the chemical formula as Ca<sub>1-2x</sub>Sr<sub>1-y</sub>Al<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:xCe<sup>3+</sup>,xLi<sup>+</sup>,yEu<sup>2+</sup>, and the real preferred crystallographic positions of the doped ions were refined using Rietveld method, which will be discussed later. Firstly, Fig.1 presents the XRD patterns of as-prepared
- $_{40}$  Ca0.9SrAl\_2SiO7:0.05Ce $^{3+},0.05Li^+$  (i), Ca0.9Sr0.995Al\_2SiO7: 0.05Ce $^{3+},0.05Li^+,0.005Eu^{2+}$  (ii), and the standard data for CaSrAl\_2SiO7 (JCPDS 26-327) is also shown as a reference. The two as-prepared samples exhibit the same diffraction peaks, which can be indexed to the phase of CaSrAl\_2SiO7 (JCPDS 26-
- <sup>45</sup> 327), and no other phases were detected. Therefore, our samples are of phase purity and the activators of Ce<sup>3+</sup>/Li<sup>+</sup> and Eu<sup>2+</sup> ions have dissolved into the crystal lattice of CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>.

It is found that no Inorganic Crystal Structure Database (ICSD) file for the CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> is available. In order to give an insight into the crystallographic sites and the crystal structure of the 55 melilite-type CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> phase and the doped ions, the selected sample with designed chemical composition of Ca<sub>0.98</sub>SrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:0.01Ce<sup>3+</sup>,0.01Li<sup>+</sup> was refined using Rietveld method performed by using TOPAS 4.2. In such a model, sites of Ca ions were occupied by Sr ion with fixed occupation p = 0.560 and by Ce and Li ions with p = 0.05 and p = 0.05, respectively, according to the chemical formula. Fig.2 shows us the Rietveld refinement of the XRD profile of the selected Ca<sub>0.98</sub>SrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:0.01Ce<sup>3+</sup>,0.01Li<sup>+</sup>, and the crystal structure of Ca<sub>0.98</sub>SrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:0.01Ce<sup>3+</sup>,0.01Li<sup>+</sup> with coordination of the cation 65 with oxygen atoms is also demonstrated. As the tetragonal cell  $(P-42_1m)$  fits very well majority of the peaks, and the crystal structure data of Ca<sub>2</sub>Al<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> was performed as starting model to solve the structure.<sup>19</sup> As we can find from Fig 2a, it shows the Rietveld refinement result of Ca0.98SrAl2SiO7:0.01Ce<sup>3+</sup>.0.01Li<sup>+</sup>.

- <sup>70</sup> including the observed patterns (black), calculated patterns (red), and difference patterns (gray) and the Bragg reflections of the calculated patterns, and they give the good result on the agreement. The structure refinement was stable and ended with low R-factors shown in Table 1. That's to say, when doping with
- <sup>75</sup> 0.01 mol Ce<sup>3+</sup> and 0.01 mol Li<sup>+</sup> in the CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> host, it gets a single-phase structure, and the Ca<sub>0.98</sub>SrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:0.01Ce<sup>3+</sup>,0.01Li<sup>+</sup> crystallizes in a tetragonal unit cell with space group *P*-42<sub>1</sub>*m* and lattice constants of a = 7.7595(2) Å, c = 5.1680(2) Å, and cell volume = 311.16(2) Å<sup>3</sup>. The obtained fitted parameters are  $\chi^2 =$
- so 1.22,  $R_P = 6.94\%$ , and  $R_{WP} = 9.01\%$ . Furthermore, fractional atomic coordinates and isotropic displacement parameters ( $Å^2$ ) of Ca<sub>0.98</sub>SrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:0.01Ce<sup>3+</sup>,0.01Li<sup>+</sup> are also given in Table 2, and the results show that the designed chemical formula and the preferred crystallographic positions of the doped ions are 85 reasonable. Fig 2b shows the crystal structure of Ca0.98SrAl2SiO7:0.01Ce3+,0.01Li+ with the corresponding coordination of the cation with oxygen atoms. We know that Ca2+ and Sr<sup>2+</sup> have the same coordination environment. Coordination of the cation sites with oxygen presents that the Sr/Ca was 90 coordinated with eight oxygen atoms. In CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> host, these are two kinds of Al3+ sites which are named Al1 and Al2 for easier identification. The Al1 with four oxygen ions constitute the Al1O4 tetrahedron, and Al2 with Si constitute (Al2Si)O4 tetrahedron. In order to give more information on the

95 Ca<sub>0.98</sub>SrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:0.01Ce<sup>3+</sup>,0.01Li<sup>+</sup> phosphor, the crystallographic

#### 3.2 Luminescent Properties of Ce<sup>3+</sup>/Li and Eu<sup>2+</sup> singly or co-<sup>25</sup> doped CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> phosphors

Fig.3a displays the PLE and PL spectra of Ca0.9SrAl2SiO7:0.05Ce3+,0.05Li+ phosphor. The PLE spectrum monitored at 477nm exhibits a broad band from 250 to 450 nm, which is ascribed to the transitions from the ground state of the 30 Ce<sup>3+</sup> ions to the field splitting levels of the 5d state.<sup>20</sup> The PL spectrum consists of an asymmetric broad band peaking at 477 nm under the excitation of 365 nm. As we know, such an asymmetric broad band should be ascribed to the characteristics of double-band emission of Ce<sup>3+</sup>, which is due to the transition of  $_{35}$  Ce<sup>3+</sup> ions from the 5*d* excited state to the  $^{2}F_{7/2}$  and  $^{2}F_{5/2}$  ground states. Fig.3b gives the PL spectra of Ca1-2xSrAl2SiO7:xCe3+,xLi+ (x = 0.01, 0.03, 0.05, 0.07, 0.10 and 0.15). All the PL spectra exhibited a broad band UV emission centered at 477nm, which was also ascribed to the 5d<sup>1</sup>-4f<sup>1</sup> of Ce<sup>3+</sup> ion. The optimal Ce<sup>3+</sup> 40 dopant content was found to be 0.05 mol per formula unit and the PL intensity was observed to increase with increasing x when x<0.05. That's to say, with  $Ce^{3+}$  dopant content higher than 0.05, concentration quenching was observed and the PL intensity was found to decrease with increasing Ce<sup>3+</sup>.

The inset of Fig. 4 shows the PL intensity as a function of  $Ce^{3+}$  content for  $Ca_{1-2x}SrAl_2SiO_7:xCe^{3+},xLi^+$ , and we can clearly find that the optimal doping concentration was determined as x = 0.05 and the intensity declines dramatically as the content of  $Ce^{3+}$  <sup>10</sup> exceeds 5 mol % due to the concentration quenching. Furthermore, we can get the intensity of multipolar interaction from the change of the emission intensity which from the emitting level according to the report of Van Uitert. The emission intensity (*I*) per activator ion follows Eq.:

where *I* is the emission intensity, *x* is the concentration of the activator ions above the concentration quenching point,  $\beta$  and K are constants for the same conditions, and  $\theta$  is the function of multipole-multipole interaction for 6 (dipole-dipole), 8 (dipole-

<sup>20</sup> quadrupole) or 10 (quadrupole-quadrupole). To obtain a correct  $\theta$  the dependence of lg(*I*/*x*) on lg(*x*) is plotted, and it yield a straight line with a slope of  $-\theta/3$ . The fitting result for Ce<sup>3+</sup> emission centers, which is corresponding to the high Ce<sup>3+</sup> concentrations Ca<sub>1-2x</sub>SrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:*x*Ce<sup>3+</sup>,*x*Li<sup>+</sup> phosphor compositions, is shown in <sup>25</sup> Fig.4. The slope is -2.990, that the value of  $\theta$  can be calculated as

8.97, which is approximately equal to 8. It means that the quenching is ascribed to the dipole-quadrupole interaction in the  $Ca_{1-2x}SrAl_2SiO_7:xCe^{3+},xLi^+$  phosphor compositions.<sup>21-23</sup>

Fig.5 presents the emission and excitation spectra of Ce<sup>3+</sup>/Li<sup>+</sup>, Eu<sup>2+</sup> singly doped and Ce<sup>3+</sup>/Li<sup>+</sup>/Eu<sup>2+</sup>-co-doped CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> 35 phosphors. Fig.5a displays the PL and PLE spectra of Ca<sub>0.9</sub>SrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:0.05Ce<sup>3+</sup>,0.05Li<sup>+</sup> phosphor. The broad-band emission and excitation behaviors have been discussed above. demonstrates the PL and PLE Fig.5b spectra of CaSr<sub>0.995</sub>Al<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:0.005Eu<sup>2+</sup>. The PLE spectrum monitored at 542 40 nm exhibits a broad band from 200 to 500 nm, and the PL spectrum consists of broad band centered at 542 nm under the excitation of 365 nm, which is ascribed to the electric dipole allowed transition of the Eu2+ ions. A notable spectral overlap between the PLE spectrum of CaSr0.995Al2SiO7:0.005Eu2+ and the 45 PL spectrum of Ca0.9SrAl2SiO7:0.05Ce<sup>3+</sup>,0.05Li<sup>+</sup> is observed. So the energy transfer from Ce<sup>3+</sup> to Eu<sup>2+</sup> ions can be achieved in the CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> system.<sup>24</sup> To further confirm the phenomenon, Fig.5c illustrates the PLE and PL spectra Ca0.9Sr0.995Al2SiO7:0.05Ce3+,0.05Li+,0.005Eu2+ phosphor. The 50 co-doped phosphor shows a green emission band of Eu<sup>2+</sup> ions and a blue emission band of Ce<sup>3+</sup> ions at the irradiation of 365 nm. When monitoring at 542 nm and 477 nm, the peak positions of the PLE spectra are all located at about 365 nm. The above analysis on the PL and PLE spectra of CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:Ce<sup>3+</sup>,Li<sup>+</sup>,Eu<sup>2+</sup> 55 phosphors proves the occurrence of the energy transfer from the Ce3+ to Eu2+ ions.25





## 3.3 Energy Transfer of Ce<sup>3+</sup>/Li<sup>+</sup>/Eu<sup>2+</sup>-co-doped CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> phosphors

As mentioned above, energy transfer can be expected from the spectral overlap of the singly doped samples. Therefore, in order to further investigate the energy transfer process between the  $Ce^{3+}$  and  $Eu^{2+}$  ions in the CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> host lattice, we have studied the

- <sup>5</sup> luminescent properties of a series of samples. Fig.6 displays the PL spectra of Ca<sub>0.9</sub>Sr<sub>1-y</sub>Al<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:0.05Ce<sup>3+</sup>,0.05Li<sup>+</sup>,yEu<sup>2+</sup> samples under 365 nm excitation with a fixed Ce<sup>3+</sup> content of 0.05 and a varying Eu<sup>2+</sup> content *y* in the range of 0-0.010. As shown in Fig.6, we can know that the emission peak has a red shift from 477 nm
- <sup>10</sup> to 535 nm with the increasing concentration of Eu<sup>2+</sup>, and the color of phosphors can be tuned from blue to green. The results indicate that energy transfer from Ce<sup>3+</sup> to Eu<sup>2+</sup> occurs in Ca<sub>0.9</sub>Sr<sub>1-</sub> $_{y}$ Al<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:0.05Ce<sup>3+</sup>,0.05Li<sup>+</sup>,yEu<sup>2+</sup> phosphors.

The critical distance  $R_c$  among the activators can be calculated by using the following relation:

$$R_c = 2 \left( \frac{3V}{4\pi x_c N} \right)^{\frac{1}{3}}$$

- <sup>20</sup> where  $x_c$  is the atom fraction of activator at which the quenching occurs; *V* is the volume of the unit cell and *N* is the number of CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> molecular per unit cell. For CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> host lattice, N = 1, V = 311.16, and  $x_c$  is 0.055 denotes the sum of Ce<sup>3+</sup> concentration of 0.05 and the Eu<sup>2+</sup> concentration of 0.005. The
- <sup>25</sup> critical distance  $R_c$  is determined to be 22.1Å, which shows that the energy transfer mechanism is governed by multipolar interaction in this system.<sup>26,27</sup>

Under normal circumstances, the energy transfer from the sensitizer to activator maybe a multipolar interaction or via an

<sup>30</sup> exchange interaction occurs at higher concentration. According to Dexter's formula of multipolar interaction, the following relation can be obtained:

$$\frac{I_{SO}}{I_S} \propto C^{n/3} \tag{3}$$

where  $I_{so}$  and  $I_s$  are the luminescence intensities of Ce<sup>3+</sup> in the absence and presence of Eu<sup>2+</sup>, respectively; C is the concentration of the sum of Ce<sup>3+</sup> and Eu<sup>2+</sup>; and n = 6, 8, and 10 for dipole– dipole, dipole–quadrupole, and quadrupole–quadrupole interactions, respectively. The relationships between (*Iso/Is*) vs C<sup>n/3</sup> are illustrated in Fig.7, and when n = 10 we can observe a

<sup>40</sup> linear behavior with the optimum fitting factor of  $R^2 = 0.9814$ . The result clearly shows that the energy transfer from Ce<sup>3+</sup> to Eu<sup>2+</sup> follows a quadrupole–quadrupole interaction.<sup>28</sup>

<sup>45</sup> To further analyze the energy transfer behaviors from Ce<sup>3+</sup> to Eu<sup>2+</sup>, lifetime values of Ce<sup>3+</sup> emission are calculated by analyzing decay curves of Ca<sub>0.9</sub>Sr<sub>1-x</sub>Al<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:0.05Ce<sup>3+</sup>,0.05Li<sup>+</sup>,*x*Eu<sup>2+</sup> phosphors. Fig.8 gives the fluorescence decay curves of Ce<sup>3+</sup> emission under excitation at 365 nm and by monitoring emission <sup>50</sup> peak at 477 nm. It is found that all the decay curves can be well fitted with a second-order exponential decay, which can be fitted by the equation:

$$I(t) = I_0 + A_1 \exp(-t/\tau_1) + A_2 \exp(-t/\tau_2)$$

where I(t) is the luminescence intensity, t is the time, A<sub>1</sub> and A<sub>2</sub> <sup>55</sup> are constants, and  $\tau_1$  and  $\tau_2$  are rapid and slow decay time for the exponential components, respectively. According to fitting the parameters in Eq. (4), the average lifetime  $\tau^*$  can be obtained by the formula as follows:

$$\tau^* = (A_1\tau_1^2 + A_2\tau_2^2)/(A_1\tau_1 + A_2\tau_2)$$

<sup>60</sup> Therefore, the decay lifetime values at 477 nm are determined to be 38.13, 26.97, 23.85, 18.16, 16.65 and 12.01 ns. Obviously the decay lifetime values decreased monotonically as the  $Eu^{2+}$  concentration increases, which also strongly demonstrated the energy transfer from Ce<sup>3+</sup> to Eu<sup>2+</sup>.

In addition, the energy transfer efficiency  $\eta_T$  between the Ce<sup>3+</sup> <sup>70</sup> and Eu<sup>2+</sup> ions can be obtained from the decay lifetime values by using the following equation: <sup>29-30</sup>

$$\eta_T = 1 - \frac{\tau_x}{\tau_0} \tag{6}$$

where the  $\tau_x$  and  $\tau_0$  represent the lifetime values of sensitizer (Ce<sup>3+</sup>) ion with and without the presence of activator (Eu<sup>2+</sup>),

respectively. As shown in Fig.9, the energy transfer efficiencies increase gradually with increasing Eu<sup>2+</sup> concentration and  $\eta_T$  are calculated to be 0, 30.05, 37.45, 52.37, 56.33 and 68.51% for the Ca<sub>0.9</sub>Sr<sub>1-x</sub>Al<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:0.05Ce<sup>3+</sup>,0.05Li<sup>+</sup>,*x*Eu<sup>2+</sup> phosphors with x = 0, 5 0.001, 0.003, 0.005, 0.007 and 0.010, respectively.

## 3.4 Thermal quenching, CIE chromaticity coordinates and emission colors of CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:Ce<sup>3+</sup>,Li<sup>+</sup>,Eu<sup>2+</sup>

20 Thermal quenching behaviors of the selected phosphor have been studied. As shown in Fig. 10a, the temperature dependent emission spectra under the excitation of 365 nm for the selected Ca<sub>0.9</sub>Sr<sub>0.995</sub>Al<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:0.05Ce<sup>3+</sup>,0.05Li<sup>+</sup>,0.005Eu<sup>2+</sup> phosphor has been given, and it is found that emission intensities decrease and <sup>25</sup> the emission peaks shift to the blue region with increasing temperature, which is similar as previous report.<sup>2</sup> Furthermore, the relative emission intensities for the Ce<sup>3+</sup>/Li<sup>+</sup>, Eu<sup>2+</sup> singly doped and Ce<sup>3+</sup>/Li<sup>+</sup>/Eu<sup>2+</sup>-co-doped CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> phosphors as a function of temperature were also given in Fig. 10b. As can be <sup>30</sup> seen, the relative PL intensity slowly decreases with increasing temperature. When the temperature was raised up to 150 °C, the PL intensity of the sample drops to 53.3%, 50.5% and 43.5% of the initial value at room temperature for the corresponding Ca<sub>0.9</sub>SrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:0.05Ce<sup>3+</sup>,0.05Li<sup>+</sup>, Ca<sub>0.9</sub>Sr<sub>0.995</sub>Al<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:0.05Ce<sup>3+</sup>, and CaSr<sub>0.995</sub>Al<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:0.005Eu<sup>2+</sup> phosphors. It

is found that the Ce<sup>3+</sup>/Li<sup>+</sup>/Eu<sup>2+</sup>-co-doped CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> phosphor has better thermal stability compared to others.

The CIE chromaticity coordinates for different samples in Ca0.9Sr1-xAl2SiO7:0.05Ce<sup>3+</sup>,0.05Li<sup>+</sup>,xEu<sup>2+</sup> phosphors were 40 measured based on the corresponding PL spectra upon 365 nm excitation, and the results are summarized in Fig.11 and Table 3, respectively. From this diagram, we can see that the emission color of the phosphors can be easily modulated from blue to green by simply change the value of x from 0 to 0.01. 45 Accordingly, the corresponding CIE coordinates of Ca0.9Sr1- $_xAl_2SiO_7:0.05Ce^{3+}, 0.05Li^+, xEu^{2+}$  change from (0.172, 0.177) to (0.304, 0.408), due to the variation of the emission composition of the Ce<sup>3+</sup> and Eu<sup>2+</sup> ions. The inset in Fig.11 also illustrates the of this series digital photos of Cao 9Sr1-<sup>50</sup> xAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:0.05Ce<sup>3+</sup>,0.05Li<sup>+</sup>,xEu<sup>2+</sup> phosphors under 365 nm UV lamp excitation. These results indicate that the Ca0.9Sr1xAl2SiO7:0.05Ce<sup>3+</sup>,0.05Li<sup>+</sup>,xEu<sup>2+</sup> phosphor may have a broad application prospects for *n*-UV LEDs.

#### 4 Conclusion

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In summary, a series of  $Ce^{3+}/Li^+$ ,  $Eu^{2+}$  singly doped and  $Ce^{3+}/Li^+/Eu^{2+}$ -co-doped CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> phosphors have been synthesized. Rietveld structure refinement indicates that CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub> crystallizes in a cubic unit cell with space group *P*-

- ${}_{5}42_{1}m$  and lattice constant of a = 7.76 and c = 5.17. The quadrupole–quadrupole interaction mechanism should be mainly responsible for the energy transfer in CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:Ce<sup>3+</sup>,Li<sup>+</sup>,Eu<sup>2+</sup> phosphor. The emission color of the obtained phosphors can be tuned from blue (0.172, 0.177) to green (0.304, 0.408) by
- <sup>10</sup> adjusting the concentration of  $Eu^{2+}$ . Energy transfer efficiency between  $Ce^{3+}$  and  $Eu^{2+}$  increases and when the  $Eu^{2+}$  doping content of x = 0.010 can get the maximum value of 68.51%. This indicates that CaSrAl<sub>2</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>:Ce<sup>3+</sup>,Li<sup>+</sup>,Eu<sup>2+</sup> can act as a potential blue-green tunable phosphor for the white light emitting diodes <sup>15</sup> application.
